MAYOR'S MESSAGE

Dear Community:

First, I want to thank all of you for your patience as the City worked with the Washington Department of Transportation during the SR 203 closure. I know that it was a challenge for many as they were detoured through town. For those that live on Kennedy, I really appreciated your patience as we worked to divert trucks and as much secondary traffic as possible from traveling up your street. The road was opened later than we expected due to unforeseen challenges with the project.

Now that the culvert portion of this important street and public safety project is complete, the City will begin working with the contractor to complete the sidewalk and railing portion of the project. Overall this project is the realization of a community goal and desire to continue sidewalks from downtown to the end of town, at Big Rock Road, unite the feel of 'Main Street', and provide the environmental, safety, pedestrian and public art linkage to connect Duvall for the next century.

School has started and with many of our kids at many of the intersections within town, I ask that we take a few moments to watch out for them. Buses start around 7:00am. and continue through 9:30am. As you are aware, bus hours coincide with some of the busiest commute hours in town. With the start of the school year, comes the start of school sports. I cannot believe how fast time flies.





SPU WATER SUPPLY UPDATE

With continued record temperatures, record low stream flows into storage reservoirs, and the onset of El Niño conditions, Seattle Public Utilities (SPU) changed its water supply outlook from **good** to **fair**. The City of Duvall purchases all of its water from SPU and we are following water-use reduction recommendations requested by SPU at this time.

The utility is now making operational changes to maximize water supply, and customers are asked to continue to use water wisely. We are in the Voluntary reduction stage and have been for a couple weeks. A report that was released on August 26, 2015 shows that the region has achieved the goal of reducing its water consumption by 10% as requested. WATER CONSERVATION TIPS

Did you know the typical family of four can use 400 gallons of water every day? On average, approximately 70% of that water is used indoors. The typical household retrofitted with water-efficient fixtures and appliances can save 30,000 gallons of water per year.

Tips:

Older toilets use between 3.5 and 7 gallons of water per flush. By switching to a newer, water-efficient toilet, you can use 30% to 80% less water.



Older washing machines use between 27 and 54 gallons of water per load. Today's standard machines use 23 gallons per load. By switching to a newer, energy- and water-conserving model (front-loading or top-loading, non-agitator style), you can use fewer than 15 gallons per load.

Not rinsing dishes prior to loading the dishwasher could save up to 10 gallons per load.

Utilize efficient plant watering systems, and water before 10:00 AM or after 7:00 PM. Also be sure to check your irrigation systems for leakage.
